












#### **DISTRIBUTION OF HOUSEHOLD INCOME AND EXPENDITURE 2021**

## Household income posted RM976.4 billion in 2021

- In 2021, Malaysia's total household income reached RM976.4 billion, with compensation of employees & unincorporated business profits contributing the largest share valued at RM765.0 billion (78.4%).
- The second highest contributor to household income in 2021 was distributed profits with a value of RM83.2 billion (8.5%). This was followed by social benefits & periodical payments totaling RM66.9 billion (6.8%), household financing at RM55.8 billion (5.7%) and current transfers at RM5.5 billion (0.6%).
- In terms of expenditure, the total income of households was spent on consumption on domestic & imported commodities, which accounted for RM884.5 billion (90.6%) and income tax & other current taxes at RM47.8 billion (4.9%). This was followed by current transfers to households including transfers to abroad, such as remittances, recorded at a value of RM28.2 billion (2.9%), while household savings amounted to RM15.9 billion (1.6%).
- Malaysian citizens in 2021 received RM510.3 billion in compensation of employees, with a significant contribution in urban areas, accounting for 82.9 per cent, while 17.1 per cent was in rural areas. By income category, the medium income category recorded the largest share at 42.8 per cent (RM218.3 billion), followed by the low income category at RM166.5 billion (32.6%) and high income category at RM125.5 billion (24.6%). From a gender perspective, male employees received RM317.6 billion (62.2%) as compensation of employees, exceeding the total received by female employees, which amounted to RM192.7 billion (37.8%).
