MYAGRISTATS 2024: AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS OF SABAK BERNAM, KLUANG AND BANDAR BAHARU DISTRICTS

Sabak Bernam: 7.0 Thousand Hectares of Coconut Planted Area Drives Selangor's Economy

PUTRAJAYA, 6th July 2026 – Today, the Department of Statistics Malaysia (DOSM) announced the publication of MyAgriStats 2024 for three selected administrative districts, namely Sabak Bernam (Selangor), Kluang (Johor) and Bandar Baharu (Kedah). These three districts represent the first phase of the MyAgriStats publication, and coverage will be progressively expanded to other administrative districts nationwide to complete the picture of agricultural statistics at the district level. This report compiles key statistics on the activities of the Crops, Livestock, Capture Fisheries, Aquaculture as well as Forestry & Logging subsectors in the respective districts.

The statistics presented in this publication are the result of the compilation of secondary data from administrative sources of technical agencies related to the agricultural sector, namely the Department of Agriculture, Department of Veterinary Services, Department of Fisheries and Forestry Department. The data were rearranged, verified and integrated with other DOSM publications to ensure a coherent report at the district level.

The availability of agricultural statistics up to the district level will benefit government agencies and agricultural entrepreneurs in formulating more targeted planning and ensuring the effective distribution of resources. Strategic decisions in selecting potential agricultural areas must be made correctly and based on comprehensive and sufficient evidence and facts to strengthen the nation's food security.

This publication is intended to serve as an additional reference source to assist agricultural entrepreneurs in planning production and marketing strategies for agricultural produce. In addition, this publication can help in making more accurate and strategic decisions in identifying potential agricultural products in the three selected districts.

In the district of Sabak Bernam, Selangor, coconut clearly dominates the district's planted area with 7.0 thousand hectares, producing 105.0 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM169.1 million. Red chilli

followed with a production value of RM9.4 million (1,000.0 metric tonnes from a planted area of 40.0 hectares), followed by banana valued at RM8.2 million (4,000.0 metric tonnes from a planted area of 250.0 hectares).

Marine Capture Fisheries also stood out in Sabak Bernam. Fourfinger threadfin (senangin) recorded a high production of 1.4 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM38.1 million, followed by large white prawn (udang putih/kertas besar) with 0.9 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM50.6 million, and Chinese pomfret (bawal tambak) with 0.7 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM49.2 million. For the Aquaculture sector, red tilapia was the main produce (2,050.5 metric tonnes valued at RM19.5 million), followed by tiger prawn (804.2 metric tonnes valued at RM28.9 million) and white prawn (75.2 metric tonnes valued at RM2.1 million).

Moving to the district of Kluang, Johor, pineapple emerged as the largest contributor with a production value of RM363.4 million (149.6 thousand metric tonnes), followed by durian valued at RM98.0 million (5.1 thousand metric tonnes) and mustard greens (sawi) valued at RM27.4 million (7,000.0 metric tonnes). Inland Capture Fisheries activities in Kluang centred on beardless barb (temperas) with 103.4 metric tonnes valued at RM413.5 thousand, river catfish (baung) with 53.2 metric tonnes valued at RM958.2 thousand and giant freshwater prawn (udang galah) with 50.7 metric tonnes valued at RM2.5 million. The Aquaculture sector in Kluang was led by ornamental fish farming through the Malaysian Golden Arowana with a production value of RM4.3 million (9.6 thousand tails), followed by red tilapia (191.7 metric tonnes valued at RM2.3 million) and catfish (keli) (87.3 metric tonnes valued at RM453.2 thousand).

In the district of Bandar Baharu, Kedah, durian was the main crop with a production value of RM131.8 million (6.9 thousand metric tonnes), followed by pineapple (1.3 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM3.3 million) and mangosteen (349.1 metric tonnes valued at RM1.9 million). River catch activities under Inland Capture Fisheries involved terbul fish (35.5 metric tonnes valued at RM212.8 thousand), giant freshwater prawn (udang galah) with 19.3 metric tonnes valued at RM1.3 million and river catfish (baung) with 18.1 metric tonnes valued at RM725.4 thousand. The Aquaculture sector focused on catfish (keli) at 1.4 thousand metric tonnes valued at RM8.3 million, red tilapia (72.8 metric tonnes valued at RM945.9 thousand) and ornamental Golden Arowana (Highback) at 455.0 tails valued at RM36.4 thousand.

In terms of economic contribution, the agricultural sector continued to contribute significantly to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of the selected districts. In 2020 (at constant prices), the agricultural sector in Kluang contributed RM3,575 million, followed by Sabak Bernam (RM918 million) and Bandar Baharu (RM272 million).

Chief Statistician Malaysia, Dato' Sri Dr. Mohd Uzir Mahidin said, *"This data is the result of close collaboration among various technical agencies, namely the Department of Agriculture, Department*

of Veterinary Services, Department of Fisheries and Forestry Department. I hope this detailed information will be fully utilised by all parties to strengthen the nation's food security.”

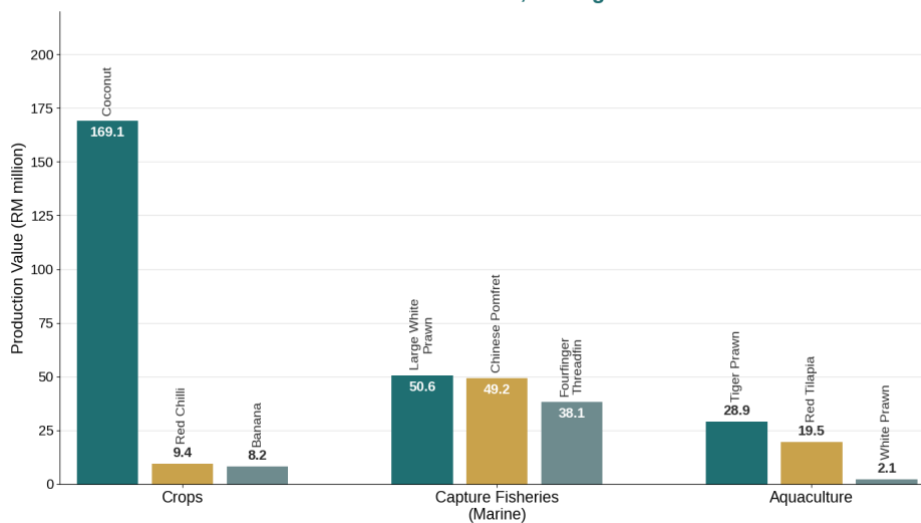
The Department of Statistics Malaysia (DOSM) is currently conducting the **Economic Census 2026 (BE2026)** with the theme “Data Nadi Ekonomi Rakyat”. This sixth Economic Census is being carried out from 5th January to 31st October 2026. BE2026 aims to collect comprehensive and structured data from all registered and unregistered business establishments in Malaysia, to assess the performance, structure and characteristics of the national economy comprehensively and based on evidence.

Malaysia has, for the first time, been ranked **first (1st)** globally in the biennial **Open Data Inventory (ODIN) 2024/25** report released by Open Data Watch (ODW), surpassing 197 other countries. This achievement marks a significant leap from the 67th position in the ODIN 2022/23 assessment.

Display 1: Production value of Crops, Capture Fisheries & Aquaculture (RM million) by main activity, Sabak Bernam, Selangor, 2023

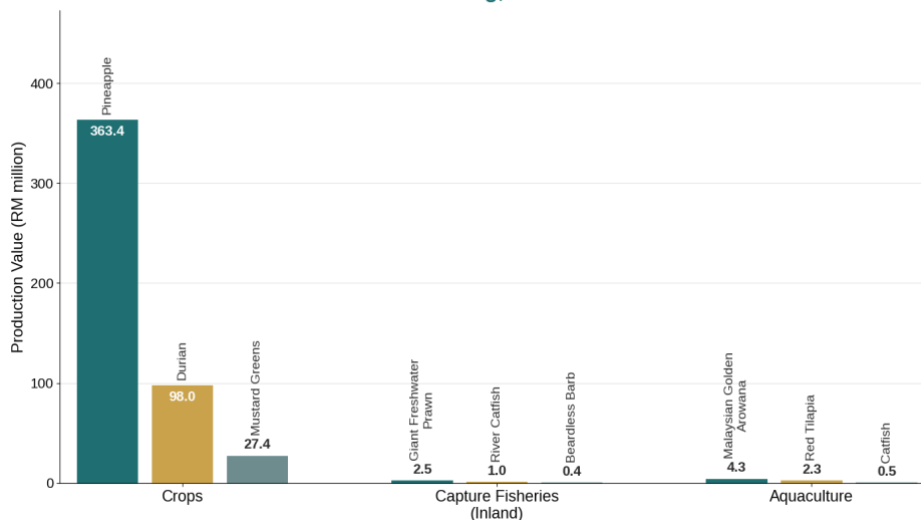

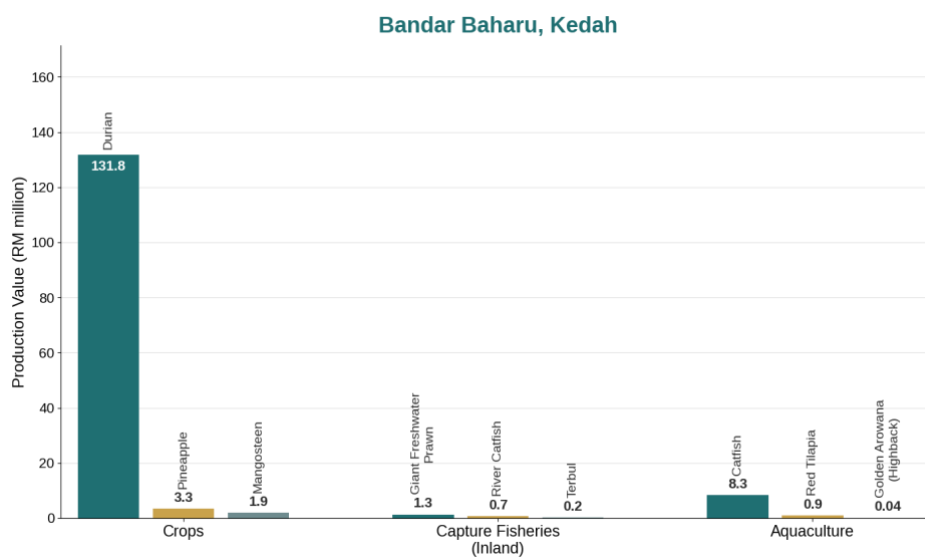
Display 2: Production value of Crops, Capture Fisheries & Aquaculture (RM million) by main activity, Kluang, Johor, 2023
